This year, Giving Tuesday will take place on December 1st. KEEF looks forward to its 7th annual participation in this fantastic movement!

Nickson is a true inspiration. After hearing about KEEF's work at the age of 26, Nickson applied for and was awarded a KEEF scholarship. Having done well in elementary school, Nickson did not have the opportunity to attend high school, as his day-labour parent was unable to cover the secondary school fees. Fortunately, with the help of KEEF supporters through previous years' Giving Tuesday campaigns, Nickson has been able to receive the high school education that he always dreamed of. Last school year, Nickson was in good academic standing and was on track to continued success before Covid-19 hit. Around this time, Nickson was in an accident and broke a leg and arm. Rehabilitation has been slow, but Nickson is on the road to recovery.

For this year's Giving Tuesday Campaign, we have made it a goal to raise sufficient funds to support Nickson through another year of high school. KEEF Fundraising Committee Report November 2020

When we look at and plan activities, the committee considers both the **potential for fundraising and for increasing community awareness of KEEF's work.** Fiscal year 2019/2020 began successfully, with our 2019 Virtual Concert raising \$1,835, Dr. Brenda Trenholme's talks about her Silk Road Ride for KEEF \$3,370, and Giving Tuesday 2019 the \$600 scholarship fees for Nickson Warema's Form Two. However, plans for late winter/early spring activities suffered the same COVID 19 pandemic lockdown that affected all charities and not-for-profit societies.

Extensive publicity efforts for a planned "Songs For Students" concert by Island Voices Choir, to be held in Black Creek on Vancouver Island, had to be cancelled at the last minute. Feedback from print and broadcast media and some of the sites where VI Committee members had put up posters was

positive – they appreciated our confirming the cancellation and they helped make mid-Island communities aware. The Island Voices Choir has expressed the hope they may sing for us at some future date. KEEF has gained two portable fabric information posters planned for initial use at the concert. One will be based in the Lower Mainland and one on the Island for future awareness and fundraising events.



Plans for Susan Peake's repeat participation in the April 2020 Vancouver Sun Run, raising pledges per kilometer for KEEF, were not realized. The Run was cancelled far enough in advance that our publicity had not yet been circulated.

In April a Student Challenge - based on Brenda Trenholme's cancelled South American ride and aimed at awareness raising, not fundraising - was issued to secondary students across BC. Each of BC's sixty public school districts, the Independent Schools and First Nations Schools Associations, homeschooling parents groups, the BC Retired Teachers Association, BCTF, the Association of Kenyans in BC (KENBC) and other relevant organizations were informed. Newspaper articles and short broadcast announcements on BC French and English stations were requested. While student response was limited – partly because of the sudden announcement of a partial re-opening of schools - we received some interesting and well done responses. The randomly selected winning entry - a joint presentation by Matias Aviles Vezina and Philippe Linfoot of Ecole Victor Brodeur in Victoria - is available on our website, in French and English, and is posted on KEEF's Facebook site.

The contest prize – apart from some local publicity for the winners - was a donation by an anonymous KEEF supporter, in their honour, toward a new 2021 secondary scholarship. Special thanks to Committee members Janice Trenholme and Sarah Breakey for their French language skills that allowed us to send out material for this contest in both languages.

While the Student Challenge had a limited response, we are happy with the many people in school districts and other educational organizations and the readers/listeners of community papers/broadcasters who learned about KEEF through the major Challenge publicity blitz.

As the pandemic continued, the KEEF Board became aware of specific needs in the homes of our students. Sarah Breakey used our social media links to help make the Board's newly established COVID 19 Pandemic Relief Fund better known. Generous contributions allowed the Kakamega office to purchase and distribute revision texts to those of our Form 4 (Grade 12) students whose schools did not have enough copies to send books home. Other COVID 19 Relief Fund contributions assisted families who had experienced a parental loss during this extra stressful time; provided a basic, emergency food supply to a number of families in extreme need; and provided revision texts to additional lower Form level students. Reusable masks were a part of each distribution of books and food. The 2020 multi-week social media campaign Sarah Breakey created for KEEF, leading up to Mandela Day (July 18), helped increase awareness of the Pandemic Relief Fund.

At this time, and for the foreseeable future, we can only look at potential virtual or very small group fundraising/awareness efforts. The first will be a campaign leading up to **December 1st 2020 Giving Tuesday**, primarily on social media. Again this year, it will focus on raising 2021 scholarship fees for Nickson Warema.

We know, from recent research by Canada Helps, that donations to organizations working overseas have dropped by 29% across Canada as people focus on local needs during the pandemic.

We invite input from all KEEF supporters with ideas and/or opportunities to hold appropriately small or virtual fundraising and/or awareness activities.

Summary of the Kenyan Primary and Secondary School Calendar:

March 2020 - All schools closed due to Covid-19 (end of term 1)

October - Grade 4, Class 8 and Form 4's returned to school for Term 2. Term 3 will begin in January 2021.

November 2 - classes that resumed learning to continue under heightened safety measures on COVID-19. Preparations for national examinations to continue.

All basic education to resume learning in January 2021.

National exams for Class 8 and Form 4 will begin late March 2021.

A note to KEEF sponsors:

KEEF secondary students' fees were paid for the full school year back in January 2020. To our knowledge there will be no additional charges, however, we will keep donors informed.

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Interested in Supporting a Post Secondary Student?

Globally, post secondary education is increasingly vital, even in the rural communities we work with in Kenya. Secondary graduates with strong marks will be "called" to an institution and their expenses will be significantly reduced.

Generally there are two semesters per year and we estimate that \$600 to \$1000 per semester will cover expenses in first year, rising slightly in year 2 and beyond. Students are also eligible for student loans.
